Mission Statement

Southern Illinois University Carbondale, now in its second century, is a major public higher education institution dedicated to quality academic endeavors in teaching and research, to supportive programming for student needs and development, to effective social and economic initiatives in community, regional, and statewide contexts, and to affirmative action and equal opportunity.

Enrolling students throughout Illinois and the United States and from a large number of foreign countries, SIUC actively promotes the intellectual and social benefits of cultural pluralism, encourages the participation of non-traditional groups, and expands student horizons and leaders to superior undergraduate education.

Seeking to meet educational, vocational, professional, social, and personal needs of its diverse population of students and helping them fully realize their potential is a central purpose of SIUC. Emphasis on accessibility and regional service which creates distinctive instructional, research, and public service programs also gives SIUC its special character among the nation's research universities, and underlies other academic developments, such as its extensive doctoral programs and the schools of medicine and law.

Its programs of public service and its involvement in the civic and social development of the region are manifestations of a general commitment to enhance the quality of life through the exercise of academic skills and application of problem-solving techniques. SIUC seeks to help solve social, economic, educational, scientific, and technological problems, and thereby to improve the well-being of those whose lives come into contact with it.

- cultivates and sustains diversity through a commitment to multiculturalism, including international programming.

Priorities Statement

Southern Illinois University has an unequivocal commitment to excellence in teaching, scholarly/creative activities, and service and the achievement of these objectives within an affordable educational experience for all of our students. Within these objectives, and consistent with the distinctive missions of the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses, is an explicit commitment to the tradition of affirmatively supporting the educational needs of underrepresented and disadvantaged populations in the state.

To achieve these objectives, the following priorities have been established:

 To improve teaching and learning and strengthen undergraduate, graduate and professional education, we shall take advantage of existing and emerging programmatic strengths and bridge school-to-work by increasing work-based learning experiences for our students.

- To strengthen our commitment to faculty and staff development as well as ensure a closer correlation of productivity, faculty and staff workload, and reward systems as defined by the role and mission of each program and administrative unit.
- To expand inter- and intra-campus collaboration in order to strengthen international education, degree programs, distributed learning, fundraising, research opportunities for students and faculty, and streamline administrative processes. Resources resulting from such efficiencies shall be directed to the University's primary educational mission.
- To build public and private sector partnerships that address the state's needs and strengthen the University's leadership role in the region.

Achievement of these priorities requires the commitment and dedication of the entire University community.

Revised Mission Statement was approved by SIU Board of Trustees on March 13, 2003. Focus and Priorities statements approved by SIU Board of Trustees on June 11, 1998.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED

The purpose of this section is to define terms used in the Fact Book, and as they are used by the University. Assisting the customer to understand the terms used in the tables and graphs is a primary objective.

BUDGET

General Revenue Funds are those funds established to receive the major portion of the tax revenues and to pay the regular operating and administrative expenses of most State agencies. (Source: Comptroller's Uniform Statewide Accounting System-Procedure 09.10.20)

Educational Assistance Fund is a "Special State Fund" established July 1, 1989 by the Illinois Income Tax Act. This act establishes that a portion of the state income tax be provided as financial assistance to Elementary, Secondary, and Higher Education in the State of Illinois. (Source: Comptroller's Uniform Statewide Accounting System-Procedure 09.10.20)

University Income Funds are those funds which receive revenues such as course-specific fees and tuition at State-supported institutions of higher education. These funds are appropriated for the support, operation and improvement of State-supported colleges and universities. (Source: Comptroller's Uniform Statewide Accounting System-Procedure 09.10.20)

University Wide Services are those operations provided centrally that function for the entire University system as opposed to one specific unit.

ENROLLMENTS

Full-time students are undergraduate students enrolled for 12 or more credit hours per semester and graduate students enrolled for 9 or more credit hours per semester. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

FTE (full-time equivalent) is defined as an enrollment unit used to represent a student enrolled for a full course of study. It is calculated by dividing total credit hours generated by 15 for undergraduate students and by 12 for a graduate student for a semester FTE. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

Headcount is defined as the count of each student enrolled for one or more courses taken in a semester on the 10^{th} day of the semester's start.

Non-degree Seeking student is identified as a student enrolled in courses for credit who is not recognized by the institution as seeking a degree or formal award. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

Non-persisting indicates a student who is no longer enrolled at Southern Illinois University Carbondale in any program. Furthermore, this term is used to identify a student who is enrolled in a fall semester of an academic year and does not return the following fall semester.

Undeclared/Unclassified student is identified as a student who has enrolled in instructional courses but has not been officially accepted into one of the institution's authorized degree programs. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

FACULTY AND STAFF

Clerical and Secretarial includes all persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial inludes all persons whose primary assignments require management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department or subdivision. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Faculty (Instruction/Research/Public Service) includes all persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity (or activities), and who may hold academic-rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or the equivalent of any of these academic ranks. This is the Integrated

Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Full-time Instructional Faculty includes members of the Instruction/Research staff who are employed full time and whose major regular assignment (more than 50%) is instruction, including those with released time for research. Department chairs with faculty rank and no other administrative title are included. This is the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) definition. (Source: American Association of university Professors). Full time is defined as a 95 or greater than 95 percent appointment.

Instruction/Research Assistants includes all students employed on a part-time basis for the primary purpose of assisting in classroom or laboratory instruction or in the conduct of research. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Other Professionals (Support/Service) includes all persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either a baccalaureate degree or higher or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Part-time Faculty includes faculty with less than a 95 percent appointment at the University.

Service/Maintenance includes all persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities or grounds of the institutional property. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Skilled Crafts includes all persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Technical and Paraprofessionals includes all persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience, apprenticeship, on-the-job-training, or academic work in occupationally specific programs that result in a 2-year degree or other certificate or diploma. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

OTHER

CIP or Classification of Instructional Programs Code is a taxonomic coding scheme for secondary and postsecondary instructional programs. The CIP is the accepted Federal Government statistical standard on instructional program classifications and is used in a variety of education information surveys and databases. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Glossary of Terms.

CPI or Consumer Price Index is a measure of the average change in prices over time paid for food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics compiles this index. (Source: <u>2008 HEPI</u>, <u>Commonfund Institute</u>)

HEPI or Higher Education Price Index is a measure of the average relative level in the prices of a fixed market of goods and services purchased by colleges and universities. Government agencies and industry provide data to compile this index. (Source: <u>2008 HEPI</u>, <u>Commonfund Institute</u>)

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LAC Fees stands for "Legislative Audit Commission Guideline Fees." LAC fees are course specific fees or other revenue derived from instructional activities. Examples of this type of fee include course specific fees, application fees, graduation fees, transcript fees, and library fines.

Student Credit Hour is a unit awarded a student for completing instruction of at least one hour per week for a semester (usually 15 weeks) or laboratory work of two to three hours per week for a semester. Quarter credits and short courses are prorated according to the above standard. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

Lower Divison Students (undergraduate) is a student who has accumulated fewer than 60 semester credit hours (90 quarter credit hours) or the equivalent. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

Upper Division Students (undergraduate) is a student who has completed at least 60 semester credit hours (90 quarter credit hours) or an unclassified (irregular or special) student who has not been admitted to the graduate divison or to a professional college or school giving a post baccalaureate degree. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

Graduate I Students (graduate) is a student holding a bona fide bachelor's degree who has been admitted to the graduate division or to a professional school either as a candidate for a master's degree, advanced degree or certificate, or as an unclassified graduate student. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

Graduate II Students (graduate) is a student holding a bona fide master's degree or an advanced certificate beyond the master's degree who has been admitted to a doctoral program. Also, a student holding a bona fide bachelor's degree who has been formally admitted to a doctoral program and who has completed at least 30 semester credit hours toward the doctoral degree is considered a Graduate II student. A Graduate II student can exist only in programs for which the institution offers an approved doctoral degree. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education) **Race/ethnicity (old definition)**: Categories used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyes of the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. A person may be counted in only one group. The groups used to categorize U.S. citizens, resident aliens, and other eligible noncitizens are as follows: American Indian/Alaska Native; Asian/Pacific Islander; Black, non-Hispanic; Hispanic; White, non-Hispanic. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

Race/ethnicity (new definition effective Fall 2010): Categories developed in 1997 by the Office of Management and Budget that are used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyes of the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. The designations are used to categorize U.S. citizens, resident aliens, and other eligible noncitizens.

Individuals are asked to first designate ethnicity as Hispanic or Latino; or Not Hispanic or Latino,

Second, individuals are asked to indicate all races that apply among the following:

American Indian or Alaska Native; Asian; Black or African American; Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander; and White. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)







Attitude Toward Degree Major


Satisfaction of Baccalaureate Alumni Graduates



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




Figure 4: Admissions and Enrollments of Transfers






Figure 5: History of Diversity by Educational Level, Fall Semesters 2002-2011






Figure 7: Age of Full-time and Part-time Students, Fall Semester 2011





Figure 10: Geographic Origins of In-State Students, Fall 2011 (N=15,491)






Figure 11: Geographic Origins of Out-of-State Students, Fall 2011 (N=3,000)

Figure 13: Five-year History of Undergraduate Transfer Enrollments from Illinois Community Colleges




Figure 13: Five-year History of Undergraduate Transfer Enrollments from Illinois Community Colleges





Figure 13: Five-year History of Undergraduate Transfer Enrollments from Illinois Community Colleges




Figure 15: Full-time Employees by EEO-6 Reporting, Fall 2011





Figure 16: Full-time Faculty by EEO-6 Reporting Definitions, Fall 2011






Figure 17: Faculty Profile Carbondale Campus Only, Fall 2011









Figure 21: FY11 Off-Campus Credit Hours






Figure 25: Student Financial Aid Five-Year Comparison by Aid Type Fiscal Years 2007-2011


Figure 26: Student Financial Aid Five-Year Comparison by Aid Source Fiscal Years 2007-2011

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


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Figure 27: Total Dollars Administered, Fiscal Years 2007-2011

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets differentiates between operating and nonoperating revenues and expenses, and displays the net income or loss from operations. An operating loss will always result since revenues from state appropriations are mandated as nonoperating.

Tuition and fee revenues have been reduced by scholarship and fellowship amounts that have already been recognized as revenues. Scholarship allowances totaled \$30,009,545 in FY 2011.

The depreciation of capital assets is presented as an operating expense.

Auxiliary enterprises are operated primarily for service to students and staff and are intended to be self supporting, such as Housing, Student Center, Student Health Programs, Student Recreation Facility, and Parking.


During FY 2010 the University received federal stimulus funds - American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 - which were appropriated by the state. These funds are not available in FY 2011.

Nonoperating grants and contracts are nonexchange transactions, primarily federal student aid programs such as Pell grants.

Payments on behalf of the University represent health care and retirement costs paid by the State of Illinois on behalf of University employees. These costs are reflected as operating expenses under the appropriate functional classification and as nonoperating revenues.

NOTES:

General Revenue Funds (GR) are those funds established to receive the major portion of the tax revenues and to pay the regular operating and administrative expenses of most State agencies.

Educational Assistance Fund (EAF) is a "Special State Fund" established July 1, 1989 by the Illinois Income Tax Act. This act establishes that a portion of the state income tax be provided as financial assistance to Elementary, Secondary, and Higher Education in the State of Illinois.

University Income Funds (IF) are those funds which receive revenues such as course-specific fees and tuition at State-supported institutions of higher education. These funds are appropriated for the support, operation and improvement of State-supported colleges and universities.


University Wide Services are those operations provided centrally that function for the entire University system as opposed to one specific unit.

Figure 30: Composition of State Appropriations Carbondale Campus *






Figure 32: FY2012 Income Fund
