

#### **DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED**

The purpose of this section is to define terms used in the Fact Book, and as they are used by the University. Assisting the customer to understand the terms used in the tables and graphs is a primary objective.

#### **BUDGET**

**General Revenue Funds** are those funds established to receive the major portion of the tax revenues and to pay the regular operating and administrative expenses of most State agencies. (Source: Comptroller's Uniform Statewide Accounting System-Procedure 09.10.20)

**Educational Assistance Fund** is a "Special State Fund" established July 1, 1989 by the Illinois Income Tax Act. This act establishes that a portion of the state income tax be provided as financial assistance to Elementary, Secondary, and Higher Education in the State of Illinois. (Source: Comptroller's Uniform Statewide Accounting System-Procedure 09.10.20)

**University Income Funds** are those funds which receive revenues such as course-specific fees and tuition at State-supported institutions of higher education. These funds are appropriated for the support, operation and improvement of State-supported colleges and universities. (Source: Comptroller's Uniform Statewide Accounting System-Procedure 09.10.20)

**University Wide Services** are those operations provided centrally that function for the entire University system as opposed to one specific unit.

#### **ENROLLMENTS**

**Full-time** students are undergraduate students enrolled for 12 or more credit hours per semester and graduate students enrolled for 9 or more credit hours per semester. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

**FTE** (full-time equivalent) is defined as an enrollment unit used to represent a student enrolled for a full course of study. It is calculated by dividing total credit hours generated by 15 for undergraduate students and by 12 for a graduate student for a semester FTE. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

**Headcount** is defined as the count of each student enrolled for one or more courses taken in a semester on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of the semester's start.

**Non-degree Seeking** student is identified as a student enrolled in courses for credit who is not recognized by the institution as seeking a degree or formal award. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

**Non-persisting** indicates a student who is no longer enrolled at Southern Illinois University Carbondale in any program. Furthermore, this term is used to identify a student who is enrolled in a fall semester of an academic year and does not return the following fall semester.

**Undeclared/Unclassified** student is identified as a student who has enrolled in instructional courses but has not been officially accepted into one of the institution's authorized degree programs. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) definition. (Source: National Center for Education Statistics)

#### **FACULTY AND STAFF**

**Clerical and Secretarial** includes all persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial inludes all persons whose primary assignments require management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department or subdivision. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Faculty (Instruction/Research/Public Service) includes all persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity (or activities), and who hold academic-rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or the equivalent of any of these academic ranks. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Full-time Instructional Faculty includes members of the Instruction/Research staff who are employed full time and whose major regular assignment (more than 50%) is instruction, including those with released time for research. Department chairs with faculty rank and no other administrative title are included. This is the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) definition. (Source: American Association of University Professors). Full time is defined as a 95 or greater than 95 percent appointment.

Instruction/Research Assistants includes all students employed on a part-time basis for the primary purpose of assisting in classroom or laboratory instruction or in the conduct of research. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

Other Professionals (Support/Service) includes all persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

**Part-time Faculty** includes faculty with less than a 95 percent appointment at the University.

Service/Maintenance includes all persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities or grounds of the institutional property. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

**Skilled Crafts** includes all persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training

programs. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

**Technical and Paraprofessionals** includes all persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training. This is the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) Fall Staff general instructions.

#### OTHER

**CPI or Consumer Price Index** is a measure of the average change in prices over time paid for food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics compiles this index. (Source: <a href="Inflation Inflation">Inflation</a> Research Associates of Washington)

**HEPI or Higher Education Price Index** is a measure of the average relative level in the prices of a fixed market of goods and services purchased by colleges and universities. The U.S. Department of Education compiles this index. (Source: Inflation Measures for Schools, Colleges, and Libraries 2001 Update, Research Associates of Washington)

LAC Fees stands for "Legislative Audit Commission Guideline Fees." LAC fees are course specific fees or other revenue derived from instructional activities. Examples of this type of fee include course specific fees, application fees, graduation fees, transcript fees, and library fines.

**Student Credit Hour** is a unit awarded a student for completing instruction of at least one hour per week for a semester (usually 15 weeks) or laboratory work of two to three hours per week for a semester. Quarter credits and short courses are prorated according to the above standard. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

**Lower Divison Students (undergraduate)** is a student who has accumulated fewer than 60 semester credit hours (90 quarter credit hours) or the equivalent. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

**Upper Division Students (undergraduate)** is a student who has completed at least 60 semester credit hours (90 quarter credit hours) or an unclassified (irregular or special) student who has not been admitted to the graduate divison or to a professional college or school giving a post baccalaureate degree. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

**Graduate I Students (graduate)** is a student holding a bona fide bachelor's degree who has been admitted to the graduate division or to a professional school either as a candidate for a master's degree, advanced degree or certificate, or as an unclassified graduate student. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)

**Graduate II Students (graduate)** is a student holding a bona fide master's degree or an advanced certificate beyond the master's degree who has been admitted to a doctoral program. Also, a student holding a bona fide bachelor's degree who has been formally admitted to a doctoral program and who has completed at least 30 semester credit hours toward the doctoral degree is considered a Graduate II student. A Graduate II student can exist only in programs for which the institution offers an approved doctoral degree. (Source: Illinois Board of Higher Education)











#### **Satisfaction of Baccalaureate Alumni Graduates**

#### **Attitude Toward SIUC**




#### **Attitude Toward Degree Major**





#### Job Relationship to Major








Figure 2: Full-time Enrollment by Class Level, Fall Semesters 2003-2007



Figure 3: Admissions and Enrollments of First-Time Freshmen




Figure 4: Admissions and Enrollments of Transfers







Figure 5: History of Diversity by Educational Level, Fall Semesters 1998-2007







Figure 6: Enrollments by College, Fall Semesters 2006-2007



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


Figure 7: Age of Full-time and Part-time Students, Fall Semester 2007





Figure 11:Origin of Transfer Students from Illinois, Fall 2007





Figure 11:Origin of Transfer Students from Illinois, Fall 2007

Figure 12: Geographic Origins of In-State Students, Fall 2007




Figure 13: Geographic Origins of Out-of-State Students, Fall 2007



Figure 14: Part-time Employees by EEO-6 Reporting,




Figure 15: Full-time Employees by EEO-6 Reporting, Fall 2007



Figure 16: Full-time Faculty by EEO-6 Reporting Definitions, Fall 2007





Figure 17: Faculty Profile Carbondale Campus Only, Fall 2007

Figure 18: Average Faculty Salary



Figure 19: Degrees Awarded - Fiscal Years 1997-2007



Figure 20: FY07 On-Campus Credit Hours




Figure 21: FY07 Off-Campus Credit Hours

Figure 22: Freshman to Sophomore Retention Rates of On-Campus New Freshmen



Figure 23: First to Second Year Retention Rates of On-Campus New Transfer Students






Table 29: Full-Time Graduate Student Tuition and Fees, Academic Years 1999-2008




Figure 27: Student Financial Aid Four-Year Comparison by Aid Source Fiscal Years 2004-2007






Figure 28: Total Dollars Administered, Fiscal Years 2004-2007

The financial statements of the University are presented in a reporting format that conforms to Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements 34 and 35. Comparative data for years prior to 2002 is not available. The statements provide a comprehensive perspective of the University's financial activities and replace the fund group presentation previously required.

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets differentiates between operating and nonoperating revenues and expenses, and displays the net income or loss from operations. An operating loss will always result since revenues from state appropriations are mandated as nonoperating.

Tuition and fee revenues have been reduced by scholarship and fellowship amounts that have already been recognized as revenues.

The depreciation of capital assets is presented as an operating expense.

Auxiliary enterprises are operated primarily for service to students and staff and are intended to be self supporting, such as housing, Student Center, Student Health Programs, and Student Recreation facility.

Nonoperating grants and contracts are nonexchange transactions, including federal student aid programs.

Payments on behalf of the University represent health care and retirement costs paid by the State of Illinois on behalf of University employees. These costs are reflected as operating expenses under the appropriate functional classification and as nonoperating revenues.

The Administration Information System (AIS) accounts were transferred July 1, 2005, to the Carbondale campus from University Wide Services. This resulted in an increase in net assets of \$4,567,799 for the campus during FY 2006.

#### NOTES:

General Revenue Funds (GR) are those funds established to receive the major portion of the tax revenues and to pay the regular operating and administrative expenses of most State agencies.

Educational Assistance Fund (EAF) is a "Special State Fund" established July 1, 1989 by the Illinois Income Tax Act. This act establishes that a portion of the state income tax be provided as financial assistance to Elementary, Secondary, and Higher Education in the State of Illinois.

University Income Funds (IF) are those funds which receive revenues such as course-specific fees and tuition at State-supported institutions of higher education. These funds are appropriated for the support, operation and improvement of State-supported colleges and universities.


University Wide Services are those operations provided centrally that function for the entire University system as opposed to one specific unit.


Figure 31: Composition of State Appropriations Carbondale Campus \*

- supports the economic, social, and cultural development of southern Illinois through appropriate undergraduate, graduate, and professional education and research;
- develops partnerships with communities, businesses, and other colleges and universities, and develops utilization of telecommunications technologies;
- cultivates and sustains a commitment in research and instruction to problems and policy issues related to the region and the state's natural resources and environment;
- strives to meet the health care needs of central and southern Illinois through appropriate health-related programs, services, and public health policy; and
- cultivates and sustains diversity through a commitment to multiculturalism, including international programming.

# **Priorities Statement**

Southern Illinois University has an unequivocal commitment to excellence in teaching, scholarly/creative activities, and service and the achievement of these objectives within an affordable educational experience for all of our students. Within these objectives, and consistent with the distinctive missions of the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses, is an explicit commitment to the tradition of affirmatively supporting the educational needs of underrepresented and disadvantaged populations in the state.

To achieve these objectives, the following priorities have been established:

 To improve teaching and learning and strengthen undergraduate, graduate and professional education, we shall take advantage of existing and emerging programmatic strengths and bridge school-to-work by increasing work-based learning experiences for our students

- To enhance student success, we shall involve all members of the University community in implementing an effective, targeted recruitment strategy and improving student retention, including the elimination of obstacles to timely degree completion.
- To strengthen our commitment to faculty and staff development as well as ensure a closer correlation of productivity, faculty and staff workload, and reward systems as defined by the role and mission of each program and administrative unit.
- To expand inter- and intra-campus collaboration in order to strengthen international education, degree programs, distributed learning, fundraising, research opportunities for students and faculty, and streamline administrative processes. Resources resulting from such efficiencies shall be directed to the University's primary educational mission.
- To build public and private sector partnerships that address the state's needs and strengthen the University's leadership role in the region.

Achievement of these priorities requires the commitment and dedication of the entire University community.
